routes of travel. Do not attempt to move or relocate barricade equipment in an attempt to cross the bridge. This structure is 90 years old and extensive repairs were budgeted, however the most recent inspection report revealed worsening conditions to the main supports to the extent that demolition/removal of the bridge seems the best course of action.

The City is currently evaluating the situation, discussing options with engineers and contractors and will provide periodic updates as to what course of action it takes in regards to the bridge.

The City recognizes that this bridge closure will be an inconvenience for those who live in the immediate area however, the safety of our citizens comes first as we work through this process. We ask for your patience and understanding.



CITY TAX NEWS

REAL ESTATE AND MACHINERY AND TOOLS TAX BILLS

Real estate tax bills are mailed to property owners or mortgage holders in late May following Council's approval of the tax rate. Machinery and tools tax bills are also mailed in May. Both bills contain two payment stubs — the first half with a June 15 due date and the second half with a December 5 due date. If you have not received your 2014 bill(s) by June 2nd, please call the Treasurer's Office at 541-2240.

About two weeks prior to the due date, the Treasurer also places real estate tax notices in the local newspaper, on the City's website, and on the public cable channel. Delinquent real estate tax notices are generally mailed in early July (following the first half due date of 6/15) and early January (following the second half due date of 12/5).

Please note that real estate taxes delinquent more than two years may be forwarded to an attorney for collection which may result in auction of the property if not paid.

Elderly or disabled taxpayers may be eligible for an exemption if they are age 65 or older or permanently disabled AND meet financial criteria established by local ordinance. Veterans with 100% disability may also be eligible for tax relief. The deadline for applications is April 1 and must be submitted to Debra Kloske Reason, Commissioner of the Revenue. DELINQUENT PERSONAL PROPERTY TAXES

Citizens who owe delinquent personal property taxes or vehicle license fees may not be able to renew their registrations at DMV if taxes or fees remain unpaid. If you think you may have delinquent taxes or fees on your vehicles, please contact the Treasurer's Office at 541-2240 to verify any past due amounts.

DELINQUENT BUSINESS LICENSES

Business licenses are due to be filed with the Commissioner of Revenue by March 1 and are due to be paid at the Treasurer's Office by March 31 of every year. Per City code, a business license may not be issued if there are outstanding business license taxes, personal property taxes, and/or meals and lodging taxes.

It is important to note that a person who operates a business without a business license will be guilty of a Class 3 misdemeanor, and his or her business may be closed for failure to hold a current business license and/or failure to pay meals and lodging taxes.

Please contact the Commissioner of Revenue's Office at 541-2237 if you have not yet applied for your 2014 business license,

or the Treasurer's Office at 541-2240 if you need to pay for a delinquent business license and/or delinquent business taxes.

PAYMENT OPTIONS

In addition to paying in person, other payment options include:

Pay by Mail: Please make check payable to Treasurer, City of Hopewell and mail to Treasurer's Office, P.O. Box 199, Hopewell, Virginia 23860. Payment must be postmarked by the due date to avoid penalty and interest.

Pay at Bank: Payments may be made by the due date at the Hopewell Branch of SunTrust, located at 200 North Main Street, Hopewell, Virginia. Payments are accepted Monday through Thursday 9 am to 5 p.m., Friday 9 a.m. to 6 p.m., and Saturday 9 a.m. to 12 noon. Please bring your bill and/or payment stub with you when paying at SunTrust.

Drop Box: Payments may be dropped in the drop box located behind the municipal building across from the Police Department entrance; there is also a payment box located beside the front cashier windows outside

the Treasurer’s Office. These boxes may be used for payment of any locally collected taxes by their due date and are checked daily. Payments should be made by check or money order and payable to Treasurer, City of Hopewell.

Pay by Credit or Debit Card: Payments may be charged to your credit or debit card through a third party (Official Payments) and may be paid online at www.officialpayments.com or by phone at 1888-2PAY-TAX (1 888-272-9829). Please note that a service charge imposed by our service provider will apply. You will be required to enter Hopewell’s jurisdiction code (1023) and your 7-digit sub and parcel number (if paying real estate taxes) or your account number (if paying personal property taxes).

Payment Plans: Payment plans are also an option for paying taxes, both current and delinquent. Many citizens who no longer have a mortgage choose to make monthly or quarterly payments. If taxes are delinquent, a payment agreement may be set up; however, it is important to note that penalty and interest will continue to accrue on balances that remain unpaid after the due date(s).

ANIMAL LICENSES FOR DOGS AND CATS

Veterinarians are now required by state law to provide rabies vaccination information for dogs and cats to the Treasurer. The owner then has 90 days from the date of the vaccination to apply for an animal license. If a license is not purchased within 90 days, the Treasurer’s Office is required to send an application to the owner. The fee is \$1 per year for a dog or cat that has been spayed or neutered, and \$5 per year for those not spayed or neutered.

The Treasurer’s Office participates in a Rabies Clinic held twice a year (one in the Spring and one in the Fall) by the City’s Animal Control Department in conjunction with the Hopewell Animal Hospital. This service provides rabies vaccinations at a reduced rate and animal licenses may be purchased immediately after animals are vaccinated. Please call the Treasurer’s Office at 541-2240 for more information about animal licenses and Animal Control at 541-2204 for information on upcoming Rabies Clinics.

DMV SELECT

The City offers a convenient option for citizens by partnering with the Virginia Department of Motor Vehicles (DMV) to provide selected DMV services in the City of Hopewell. By offering DMV Select at the Commissioner’s and Treasurer’s offices, customers can conduct many routine motor vehicle-related services at a convenient location

The following is a list of DMV Select transactions that are offered at Hopewell’s Commissioner’s and Treasurer’s offices:

- Titles
- Vehicle Registrations
- Special and personalized license plate orders
- Address changes
- Voter registration application
- Vehicle and driver transcripts
- Trip permits, overload permits
- Handicapped parking placards
- Returned checks

Hunting and Fishing Licenses and Boat Registrations through Game & Inland Fisheries are also available.

The Select hours are Monday through Friday from 8:30 am to 4 p.m, excluding State Holidays. The website, www.dmvNOW.com, is available 24 hours a day, seven days a week. In addition, customers can use the mail or DMV’s automated telephone service (1-804-497-7100).

DMV 2 GO

DMV has five mobile customer service centers called DMV 2 GO that travel across the state to serve customers. The mobile units are full service and provide all DMV transactions. Customers may also purchase certified copies of Virginia birth certificates, obtain E-ZPass transponders, and apply for their hunting or fishing licenses on all five DMV mobile offices.

One of the DMV 2 GO mobile units will be in Hopewell on the following dates in 2014:

- July 1 from 8:30 a.m. to 4 pm (Beacon parking lot)
- September 20 from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. (Hooray for Hopewell)
- October 28 from 8:30 am to 4 p.m. (Beacon parking lot)

IMPORTANT UPCOMING DUE DATES

June 15 – Deadline to pay first half real estate and machinery & tools taxes without penalty or interest. Second quarter state estimated tax payments are also due.

July 1 – ABC licenses go on sale. Please apply with the Commissioner of Revenue’s Office.

July 31 – Deadline to pay for ABC licenses without penalty or interest at the Treasurer’s office.



City of Hopewell Announces New Curbside Recycling Collection! & minor changes to Trash Collection

NEW RECYCLING SERVICES:

- Residents will receive a new green cart with a yellow lid for recycling. No additional cost!
- Recycling carts will be delivered beginning the week of June 18.
- Recycling will be collected EVERY OTHER WEEK on WEDNESDAY. Collections will take place on RED or BLUE Weeks. A collection schedule will be attached to each cart when the cart is delivered.
- Recycling carts must be at the curb by 7:00 am on collection day (handle facing the house and 5 feet from any car or mailbox and 2 feet between multiple carts).
- RECYCLE only Paper, Cardboard, Aluminum and Steel Cans, Glass Bottles and Jars, Plastic Bottles with a #1 or #2 on the bottom.

TRASH COLLECTION SERVICES:

- Residents will continue to use existing trash cart.
- Trash will be collected WEEKLY – ALL on MONDAYs (this will be a change for some).
- Downtown area will be collected on THURSDAYS (Litter baskets will be collected on Mondays and Thursdays).
- Trash carts must be on the curb by 7:00am on collection day (handle facing the house and 5 feet from any car or mailbox and 2 feet between multiple carts).
- Additional Carts may be purchased for \$58.
- Bulky Waste (such as furniture, appliances, etc.) should be placed at the curb w/ the cart on collection day. Up to the equivalent of a ½ ton pickup truck will be collected. If possible, please call ahead the Trash Collection Hotline at (804) 425-0500 to schedule collection.
- Brush and Yard Waste (includes grass clippings, weeds, leaves, brush)
 - o Must be bagged and securely tied (up to 30 bags collected at a time).
 - o Limbs and brush cut to 4 feet in length and weigh

less than 75 pounds.

- Other Trash Do's and Don'ts:
 - o Place extra trash in tied trash bags next to cart for collection. No loose trash.
 - o Do not place trash on top of cart.
 - o No personal trash cans will be collected.
 - o Motor oil, anti-freeze and hazardous waste WILL NOT be accepted.
 - o Do not overload cart (200 lb. limit)
 - o Construction waste WILL NOT be accepted (such as lumber, wire, sheetrock, concrete, etc.).

HOLIDAY COLLECTION SCHEDULE:

Trash or recycling will not be collected on the following holidays:

- o New Year's Day
- o Memorial Day
- o Independence Day
- o Labor Day
- o Thanksgiving Day
- o Christmas Day

When trash or recycling is scheduled on one of these holidays or a day earlier in the same week, collection will occur one day later (i.e. Monday collection on Tuesday). Trash and recycling collection will not be affected by other holidays observed by the City.

John Randolph Medical Center Earns National Respiratory Care Award

HCA Virginia's John Randolph Medical Center has received Quality Respiratory Care Recognition (QRCR) from the American Association of Respiratory Care.

About 700 hospitals or approximately 15 percent of hospitals in the United States have applied for and received this award, which recognizes hospitals for helping patients and families make informed decisions about the quality of the respiratory care services available.

"This award reflects the highest levels of care consistent with national standards and guidelines," said Suzanne Jackson, CEO of John Randolph Medical Center. "I am proud of our team for striving to maintain our position as a trusted resource in the community and for providing our patients with the tools necessary to take charge of their health."

The QRCR program was started by the American Association for Respiratory Care (AARC) in 2003 to help consumers identify those facilities using qualified respiratory therapists to provide respiratory care. Hospitals earning the QRCR designation ensure patient safety by agreeing to adhere to a strict set of criteria governing their respiratory care services.

To qualify for the award, John Randolph Medical Center provided documentation showing it meets the following conditions:

- All respiratory therapists employed by the hospital to deliver bedside respiratory care services are either legally recognized by the state as competent to provide respiratory care services or hold credentials for certified respiratory therapist or registered respiratory therapist.
- Respiratory therapists are available 24 hours.
- Other personnel qualified to perform specific respiratory procedures and the amount of supervision required for personnel to carry out specific procedures must be designated in writing.
- A doctor of medicine or osteopathy is designated as medical director of respiratory care services.
- Hospital policy prohibits the routine delivery of medicated aerosol treatments utilizing small volume nebulizers, metered dose inhalers, or intermittent positive pressure treatments to multiple patients simultaneously. Circumstances under which this practice is permitted is defined by policy.
- Use a process that periodically compares performance of the respiratory department on efficiency and quality metrics with similar departments for the purpose of identifying and achieving best practice.

Respiratory therapists are specially trained health care professionals who work under physician's orders to provide a wide range of breathing treatments and other services to people with asthma, chronic obstructive pulmonary disease, cystic fibrosis, lung cancer, AIDS and other lung or lung-related conditions. They also care for premature infants and are key members of lifesaving response teams charged with handling medical emergencies.
