Black History Month Started As A Weeklong Celebration

February is Black History Month. In September 1915, historian Carter G. Woodson and the Rev. Jesse E. Moorland founded the Association for the Study of Negro Life and History. The organization's goal was to identify and promote the accomplishments of Americans of African descent.

Throughout Black History Month, we recognize the extraordinary achievements and acknowledge the many contributions being made by African Americans in all areas, including education, medicine, science, technology, the space program, art, public service, the military, business, politics, human and civil rights, science, engineering, sports, entertainment and much more.

In 1926, the organization sponsored a national Negro History Week, with the celebration falling in the second week of February, according to the Library of Congress site dedicated to Black History Month. This period was chosen to coincide with the birthdays of both Abraham Lincoln and Fredrick Douglass.

In response to the newly created Negro History Week, numerous schools and community groups across the country organized performances, lectures and other events to recognize and promote the achievements of black Americans.

Over the coming decades, mayors across the nation began issuing local proclamations for annual Negro History Week celebrations. The ASNLH is now known as the Association for the Study of African American Life and History.

In his 1996, President Bill Clinton issued Presidential Proclamation 6863 for "National African American History Month." This differs from previous presidents' proclamations for "National Black (Afro-American) History Month" - including those made by President Jimmy Carter and President George H.W. Bush's 1991 proclamation. In earlier proclamations, the words African-American and black were often interchanged. But every president since 1996 has proclaimed February simply as "National African American History Month."

Barack Obama said the following. As we pay tribute to the heroes, sung and unsung, of African-American history, we recall the inner strength that sustained millions in bondage. We remember the courage that led activists to defy lynch mobs and register their neighbors to vote. And we carry forward the unyielding hope that guided a movement as it bent the arc of the moral universe toward justice. Even while we seek to dull the scars of slavery and legalized discrimination, we hold fast to the values gained through centuries of trial and suffering.


Family Career and Community Leaders of America

The week of February 7-13, 2016 is National FCCLA (Family Career and Community Leaders of America). Mayor Brenda Pelham recognized our organization at the City Council Meeting on February 9th and presented our officers with a Proclamation. The organization is a nonprofit family-focused student organization consisting of Family and Consumer Sciences students through grade 12.

The classes that are offered at Hopewell High School include: Early Childhood Education I and II, Parenting, Teachers for Tomorrow, Fashion Careers, Independent Living, Catering I & II, and Nutrition and Wellness. In each program, the major focus is workplace readiness skills. This gives the students a solid background and many are able to obtain entry-level positions while in high school.

We have had students who have passed their Childhood Development Associates, with a Dual Enrollment program through John Tyler Community College. We have had several students who have gone on to college and majored in their field of study and then become leaders in their field. Governor McAuliffe Announces \$150,000 in Virginia Main Street Grants

Funding includes downtown investment and financial feasibility grants

RICHMOND – Governor McAuliffe announced today \$150,000 in Virginia Main Street funding for 10 projects in Virginia. The grants, administered by the Virginia Department of Housing and Community Development (DHCD), include Downtown Investment Grants (DIG) and Financial Feasibility Grants targeting areas of specific need in historic downtown neighborhoods located in designated Virginia Main Street communities. Through the communities it serves, the Virginia Main Street Program has generated more than \$716 million dollars in private investments and also created 15,621 jobs.

Speaking at today's announcement at an event in Richmond, Governor McAuliffe said, "These grants will create jobs and provide a needed boost to communities that are working hard to revitalize historic downtown neighborhoods. Virginia is home to so many cities and towns that are ready to thrive as centers of tourism and commerce. I am proud to partner with them and help make every Virginia Main Street a better place to live, work and start a business."

Through the Downtown Investment Grants, \$112,500 will be awarded to Main Street organizations in the designated communities of the towns of Bedford, Bristol, Culpeper, Luray, Marion and Staunton. These grants are available to designated Main Street organizations to accelerate the economic revitalization of their downtown districts by helping implement innovative strategies, plans and programs that create an environment for increased, accelerated private investment.

A total of \$37,500 in Financial Feasibility Grants will be awarded to the Main Street organizations in the towns of Altavista, Blackstone, Hopewell and St. Paul. These grants are intended

to assist owners of "white elephant" buildings identify their highest and best use and fund development of preliminary engineering reports, preliminary architecture reports, market demand studies and gap-financing research. These grants often lead to more prompt redevelopment and leverage private investment.

"In the last five years, designated Main Street communities have sparked more than \$148 million in private investment in their districts," said Secretary of Commerce and Trade Maurice Jones. "By providing funding for downtown improvement projects, we will continue to bring new life to these historic downtown communities and encourage economic growth and continued private and public investment."

In 1985, DHCD adopted the Main Street program for Virginia to help prevent downtown districts across the Commonwealth from economic decline and possible demolition. This unique program works to re-energize economic development of downtown communities while utilizing their cultural assets and character. This is further accomplished by pooling the resources of their local civic and business leaders who are determined to bring their Main Street communities back to life. The innovative Four-Point Approach © program uses design, promotion, economic restructuring and organization to reach their goal to help localities build better communities. Virginia Main Street works with 25 designated communities throughout Virginia.

Art on Display at the Community Center



Visitors entering the Hopewell Community Center are now greeted by a new piece of public art on display in the main lobby. A large chalk mural brightens the space with a variety of bright colors depicting a landscape with notable sites such as the Beacon Theater, Appomattox Manor and Weston Manor. The mural centers around the text “Welcome to the Wonder City,” a nickname the city earned after its quick redevelopment after the fire of 1915. The art project was completed by summer camp participants during the summer 2015 Center Camp held at the Community Center. Campers were given a brief history lesson before helping design and color the mural. The project was inspired by Richmond artist, Alicia Boggs, who has assisted other Recreation and Parks departments in the area with community art projects. The rough sketch of the mural was completed by long-time Hopewell native and retired art teacher, Judy Reidmiller. The kids had a great time working on the

mural and learning about the city’s history. Stop by the Hopewell Community Center to see the finished product!

Baseball/Softball Field Improvements

The Hopewell Recreation and Parks Department is investing in its baseball and softball fields with complete replacement of infield material on all four fields at the Mathis Park complex. The first two fields were completed in 2014, which required the removal of ten inches of infield material. The infields were then rebuilt with Ruckersville Problend infield mix and laser-graded to ensure appropriate drainage. The remaining two fields at the complex will be completed by the end of February and will follow the same process. The new infield material will provide a safer player experience, better drainage, and improved maintenance capabilities. Mathis Park saw additional improvements in 2015 including the installation of a practice batting cage, protective fence capping on all four fields, and a new security system for the concession and storage buildings. The department is looking forward to the 2016 baseball/softball season with all of the new facility improvements.



Aquatic Warriors



Hopewell Recreation and Parks hosted its first-ever Aquatic Warrior Competition on Saturday, February 6. Modeled after the popular television series American Ninja Warrior, participants competed to see who could navigate the water-based obstacle course in the least amount of time. The event centered around the department’s newest piece of equipment, an inflatable obstacle course. The event drew a wide range of participants ranging in ages from 6-13. Participants were broken into competitive age divisions and medals were awarded for first, second and third place. When asked what he enjoyed most about the new obstacle course, one participant simply replied “everything!” The department is looking forward to several new programming opportunities that will make use of the new equipment.
